# SCOTLAND: A TALE OF TWOS - TONGUE IN CHEEK

Scotland has three flags but only **two** are for our use. They are the Scot's blue and white Saltire and the Union flag which is an amalgam of the Scot's Saltire with the red cross of St. John (England) and the red cross of St. Patrick (Ireland). The yellow Lion Rampant flag is the Sovereign's flag and only flown by her or by her personal representative such as a Lord Lieutenant for a specific District.

Then, there are **two** ways to line up Clans at festivals. At some games there is a "traditional" line established based on the presumed Clan "precedence" but the Standing Council of Clan Chiefs has stated that there is no order of preference recognized. So, we are left with the alphabet or, since we are Scots, a lineup based on who paid first.

Scots can be called many things and frequently we are! We can be called British or we can be called Scots. The British term comes from the United Kingdom of Great Britain comprised since 1707 of Scotland and the others (England, Wales, and Northern Ireland). We all know that Scotland has always retained sovereignty for religion and law and, with devolution in recent years, now it has its own parliament restored. So, we can be known **two** ways: British or, more magnificently, Scots – but we are never English.

Then there is the question of who is Elizabeth. Her prime title is "Her Majesty Elizabeth the Second, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, and of Her Other Realms and Territories Queen, Head of the Commonwealth, Defender of the Faith." However, Scotland and England were never merged and Scotland retained its separate flag. Hence, it is appropriate to speak of Elizabeth two ways: as Queen of Scotland or as Queen of Great Britain but, in Scotland, never to speak of her as Queen of England! Or maybe we should just call her the Queen – she really is the same person.

Finally, there is the matter of number assigned to Elizabeth. When our Queen came to the throne in 1952, many thought of the legendary Queen Elizabeth, the last Tudor and executor of Mary, Queen of Scots. As a result, she became known as Elizabeth the "Second" and, indeed, the London government accepted that position. However, there never was an Elizabeth in Scotland and, thus, how could there be an Elizabeth II? So, who cares? The royal mail usually includes the Sovereign's initials on postboxes when they are cast. The new boxes appearing in Scotland with the Elizabeth II Rex (E II R) became handy targets of bombers of the Scottish persuasion. They won the history battle! Today the postboxes of Scotland have no number but instead have a Scot's Crown.
